

### **Hospital and Department Overview**

UMass Memorial Medical Center (UMMMC) is an 800+ bed academic medical center and is part of UMass Memorial Health, the largest health care system in Central Massachusetts. We are the clinical partner of UMass Chan Medical School, with access to the latest technology, research, and clinical trials. The Medical Center consists of three campuses in Worcester, MA: University, Memorial, and Hahnemann Campus.

Since starting the pharmacy residency program in 1995, we have made a significant impact on patient care by becoming an integral part of the medical teams through working directly on the hospital floors and guideline/policy development. We strive for excellence in the training of pharmacy residents, providing a positive and rewarding learning experience. Our programs are committed to training that respects the diversity of our residents and our patient population with an emphasis on professional development and wellness.

#### **General Information**

The PGY1 Pharmacy Residency Program is a yearlong, accredited program designed to build on Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) education and contribute to the development of clinical pharmacists responsible for medication-related care of patients with a wide range of conditions, eligible for board certification, and eligible for postgraduate year two (PGY2) pharmacy residency training. Over the course of the year, residents will have the opportunity to provide high-level pharmaceutical care in a variety of patient care settings and gain experience in the management of acutely ill patients. Residents will also lead a research project, strengthen their communication skills through formal and informal presentations in a variety of settings, participate in various interdisciplinary hospital committees, and complete a teaching certificate program. Teaching opportunities are provided through regional colleges of pharmacy as well as our affiliated medical school. Residents are supported throughout the year through a formal mentor program.

### **Prerequisites and Licensure**

- Candidates must be PharmD graduates of an accredited college of pharmacy
- Candidates must be eligible for Massachusetts licensure, with successful completion of NAPLEX and MPJE by September 30<sup>th</sup>
- Candidates must be US citizens or permanent US residents

- Three references (at least 1 reference from a clinical preceptor preferred)

### **Program Structure**

The PGY1 Pharmacy Residency Program is an ASHP-accredited program that is tailored to appeal to an individual desiring a well-rounded pharmacy experience. The residents will have the opportunity to provide pharmaceutical care in a variety of patient care settings including practice management, internal medicine, medical and surgical ICU, cardiology, pediatrics, infectious diseases, emergency medicine, and medication management. The majority of rotations will take place at the University Campus, but some rotations can be taken at the Memorial Campus.

#### Requirements for Successful Completion of the PGY1 Residency Program

- Massachusetts Pharmacy Licensure by September 30<sup>th</sup>
- Completion of all required learning experiences
- Completion of teaching seminar program
- Achievement of greater than or equal to 80% of goals and objectives for the program completed by the end of the residency year and achieved for residency (ACHR) for the following objectives:
  - o R1.1.1 Collect relevant subjective and objective information about the patient
  - R1.1.2 Assess clinical information collected and analyze its impact on the patient's overall health goals
  - R1.1.3 Develop evidence-based, cost effective, and comprehensive patient-centered care plans
  - o R1.1.4 Implement care plans.
  - R1.1.5 Follow-up: Monitor therapy, evaluate progress toward or achievement of patient outcomes, and modify care plans.
  - o R1.2.1 Collaborate and communicate with healthcare team members.
  - R1.2.3 Document patient care activities in the medical record or where appropriate.
  - R3.2.3 Demonstrate responsibility and professional behaviors.
- By completion of residency program, no objective can be listed as "needs improvement"
- Completion of 3 pharmacy conferences
- Participation in departmental journal clubs (2 per year)
- Completion of 1 continuing education (CE) accredited presentation
- Completion of 3 pharmacy forum presentations
- Completion of 1 formulary management project (e.g., drug class review) with formal write-up and presentation of results
- Monthly documentation of i-Vents within Epic (min average 200/month)
- Monthly documentation of duty hours
- Completion of longitudinal research project
  - Submit study to IRB for approval or exemption
  - Present poster at Vizient Pharmacy Network Meeting in December (during ASHP Midyear Clinical Meeting)
  - Complete data collection/analysis
  - Platform presentation of results at Regional Residency Conference (April/May)
  - Presentation to pharmacy department at Resident Research Symposium (June)
  - Completion of manuscript worthy of publication
